

# THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

## EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

By the Secretary of State.

WHEREAS, F. H. Cunningham, J. G. Cunningham, C. C. Good, and W. L. Gassaway all of Greenville S. C.

did on the 1st day of March 1909 file with the Secretary of State a written Declaration, signed by themselves, setting forth:

First: The names and residences of the said petitioners to be as above given.  
Second: The name of the proposed corporation be that of BROADAX POWER COMPANY.

Third: The principal place of business of the corporation will be Greenville, S. C.

Fourth: The general purpose of the corporation, and the nature of business it proposes to do, is to construct, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, maintain, operate and sell water works or powers for the purpose of supplying manufacturing corporations or individuals with water power for domestic or business purposes. Also to construct, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, maintain and sell all the necessary power houses, water towers, water mains, water pipes and dams necessary and convenient for the purpose of carrying on the aforesaid line of business. Also to lay, construct and maintain cables, wires, lines and all necessary appurtenances and appliances for the transmission of power. To purchase, lease or otherwise acquire lands and buildings for the erection and establishment of manufacturing, cotton goods and work shops with suitable plants, engines and machinery. To manufacture, buy, sell, import and export and generally deal in cotton, cotton goods and their derivatives of all classes and description. Also to be vested with the powers conferred by "An Act to grant unto Electric Lighting and Power Companies all the rights, powers and privileges subject to the same duties and liabilities as are conferred upon telegraph and telephone companies under Sections 2211, 2212, 2213, 2214, 2215, 2216, 2217, 2218 and 2219 of the Civil Code of South Carolina, and to amend said Section 2211 by adding another proviso at the end thereof. Approved the 25th day of February A. D. 1904. To purchase, lease or otherwise acquire sell and exchange lands, tenements, hereditaments improved and unimproved; also to purchase, lease and otherwise acquire all kinds of personal property, which the corporation may deem necessary or convenient for the purpose of its business; also to sell, assign, mortgage, convey or otherwise dispose of all the property and assets of the corporation on such terms as the Board of Directors shall prescribe, whether for cash or property or stocks and bonds in other corporations; also to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire and hold the same rights of ownership therein as may be permitted to natural persons, the shares, bonds and obligations of any corporation organized under the laws of any State, Territory, District of Colony of the United States or any foreign country and generally to have and enjoy and be vested with all the rights, powers, privileges and franchises conferred by the laws of this State on like corporations.

Fifth: The amount of the capital stock to be Five thousand Dollars, and the number of shares into which the same is to be divided to be Fifty.

Sixth: The capital stock to be payable as set forth in the Declaration and Petition. One Hundred dollars each.

AND WHEREAS, on 1st day of March 1909 the date above named, petitioners were commissioned by me a Board of Corporators:

AND WHEREAS, the said Board of Corporators, on the 5th day of March 1909, did file with the Secretary of State their return in writing, over their signatures, certifying, among other things, that pursuant to published notice as required in the commission of the said Corporators, the books of subscription to the capital stock of the aforesaid Company were duly opened, and that thereupon exceeding fifty per centum of the capital stock was subscribed by bona fide stockholders; that thereupon a meeting of stockholders was called, and the aforesaid Company duly organized by the election of a Board of Directors, and other necessary officers. That, furthermore, they have complied with all the requirements of the Code of Laws of the State of South Carolina, of 1902, and all Acts of parts or Acts amendatory thereto;
