Gassaway and Davis Furman, and the paved portion of Main Street, AND WHEREAS, it is desired by all parties concerned that said strip be abandoned and closed, NOW, THEREFORE, KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS that CAMPERDOWN MILLS, a corporation, in consideration of the Premises, and of the sum of ONE DOLLAR to it in hand paid, (the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged,) does hereby grant, bargain, sell and release unto W.L. Gassaway and Davis Furman, their heirs and assigns, all right, title and interest which it may have in the above described strip of land. And it does further release the said W.L. Gassaway and Davis Furman and the City of Greenville, from any liability or claim which it may have or may hereafter be entitled to on account of the closing of said strip.
