All that certain, piece, parcel or lot of land lying, being and situate in the town of Fountain Inn, State of South Carolina and County of Greenville, containing one acre more or less and having the following metes and bounds, to-wit: Beginning on a stone, Flora Nelson Templeton corner, running thence N. 84 W. 6.34 to a stone; thence S. 18 E. 7.75 links to a stone 3x; thence S. 67 E. 6.15 to a stone; thence N. 4 E. 2.70 to the beginning corner. Bounded by land of Flora Nelson Templeton, Craig Street, lands formerly belonging to J. H. Nelson estate now owned by J. L. Gray.
