South Pacolet River, containing 177 acres, more or less, and having the following metes and bounds according to a Plat thereof prepared by F. H. Fuller, bearing date April 13, 1852, to wit:

BEGINNING at a chestnut oak 3x3xom, and running thence S. 83 $\frac{1}{3}$ W., 40.70 chains to three chestnuts 3xom; thence N. 87 W., 10.38 chains to a chestnut 3xn in place of a stake; thence North 52 E., 13.50 chains to a hickory 3x3xom; thence N. 4 W., 19.15 chains to a stake 3xn (in place of white oak 3x gone); thence N. 61 E., 15.50 chains to a stake 3xnm (in place of chestnut 3xom gone); thence N. 9 E., 20.00 chains to a hickory 3xom; thence N. 81 E., 15.00 chains to a chestnut 3xnm (in place of chestnut 3xom gone); thence N. 19 E., 8.35 chains to a red oak 3xom; thence S. 59 E., 16.00 chains to a stake 3xnm cross lines; thence following the lines of the Richard Ward grant to the beginning corner as follows: S. 46 W., 31.25 chains to a stake 3xom; thence S. 26 E., 36.50 chains to the beginning corner.

(9) All that tract on the branch waters of Tyger River, containing 120 acres, more or less, being the same property described in a Deed recorded in the RMC Office for Greenville County, S. C., in Deed Volume LLL, at page 128, as having the following metes:

BEGINNING on a chestnut near Holland Pruitt's line, and running thence nearly Northeast to a chestnut oak; thence nearly North up the ridge till it strikes Joshua Gosnell's line at a stake; thence with said Gosnell's line the Templeton land to a pine on the East end of Glassy Rock; thence a conditional line between land of W. P. Hard and Perry B. Moore to a large chestnut on the East end of the Snowden Cliff; thence Southwest to a pine; thence nearly West to a chestnut near where Sarah Moore formerly lived; thence nearly Southwest to a double chestnut; thence nearly Northwest to a spruce pine on the bank of the branch; near where an old still house formerly stood; thence nearly West to the beginning corner.

(10) All that tract in Glassy Mountain Township on headwaters of North Saluda River, adjoining North Carolina line, containing 1313 $\frac{1}{3}$ acres, more or less, which property is embraced in a resurvey of said land made partly in November, 1873, and finished on July 30, 1874, by John Bankston Davis, Deputy Surveyor, and a replatting thereof prepared by William E. Strong, C. E., in October, 1903, to wit:

BEGINNING at a white oak 3x (gone) in old field on the Northeast corner of said tract of land, and running thence S. 80 W., 36.00 chains to a black oak 3x - on or near the line between the States of North and South Carolina; thence S. 72 W., 75.00 chains to a chestnut x3 on said North and South Carolina State line; thence following the said line between the States of North and South Carolina as follows: S. 8 W., 5.00 chains in Brushy Ridge Gap to a Black Gum 3x; thence S. 38 W., 3.50; thence S. 48 W., 5.00 chains; thence S. 38 W., 3.00 chains; thence S. 47 W., 2.00 chains; thence S. 34 $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 2.72 chains; thence S. 72 W., 4.00 chains; thence S. 52 $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 5.00 chains; thence S. 58 $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 7.50 chains; thence S. 57 W., 3.50 chains; thence S. 37 W., 4.00 chains to a red oak; thence N. 89 W., 3.00 chains to a stake on said North and South Carolina State line; thence leaving said line S. 58 W., 5.00 chains to a white oak x3; thence S. 34 W., 42.30 chains to a chestnut oak x3 x3on on the mountain; thence N. 73 W., 12.50 chains to a
