

8. The general nature of the business for which the corporation is organized is (it is not necessary to set forth in the purposes powers enumerated in Section 2.2) (12-12.2 Supplemental Code 1962)

In addition to all powers now or hereafter granted by law to corporations, the general nature of the business for which the corporation is organized is buying, selling, leasing, improving, subdividing, mortgaging, encumbering real and personal property; Engaging in the general contracting business; Constructing, remodeling, altering, improving buildings of every kind; performing all acts necessary to accomplish the above purposes.

9. Provisions which the incorporators elect to include in the articles of incorporation are as follows:

The president shall have full and exclusive authority to execute deeds, mortgages, notes, checks, drafts, and other documents necessary to carry on the business of the corporation.
