

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The following Deed of Conveyance from John Dawson to
Robert Smith being proven before Reuben Burrill Esq.
by the oath of John Dawson was Recorded 12th Dec. 1779

This Indenture made this third day of October in the year
of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety two between
John Dawson now in Greenville County ninety six District
and State of South Carolina of the one part & Robert Smith of
Greenville County & District and State aforesaid of the other part
Witnesseth that the said John Dawson for & in consideration
of the sum of fifty pounds Sterling money to him in hand
paid by the said Robert Smith at or before the sealing and
delivering of these presents the Receipt and payment whereof
is hereby fully acknowledged and he the said John Dawson
hath given granted bargained and sold and by these presents
doth give grant bargain & sell alien release convey and confirm
unto the said Robert Smith and to his heirs Executors and
assigns for ever all his right Interest and Claim therein to a
certain plantation tract of or parcel of land situate lying &
being in the said District Greenville County & State aforesaid
and on the South side of the Halsey Mountain on each side
of the old Indian path and small branches of Tyger Blueste
Rivers bounded on all sides with Vacant land and hath such
forms & marks as follows beginning on a Hickory St. N. 20th
to Hickory Station 3 thence to Hickory Station 3 then 32th to
to a Low Station, then to a forked Low St. N. 16th to Hickory
Station 3 20 to Black St. 155 W 13 to Hickory St. then to Lower
wood Station 110 E. 32th to Bogwood St. then to the beginning
corner containing one hundred acres be the same more or
less together with all trees woods & under woods commons
commodities advantages hereditaments ways waters and
