

117 The following deed of Conveyance from John Covenhoven to John Glass being proven before John R. Crigby Esq<sup>r</sup> by the oath of Simcock Cannon was presented & Recorded this 5<sup>th</sup> day of August 1795

This Adventure made the seventeenth day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & Ninety four Between John Covenhoven of South Carolina & in Union County of the one part & John Glass of Greenville County of the other part witnesseth that the S<sup>r</sup> John Covenhoven for & in consideration of the sum of thirty pounds to him in hand paid by the S<sup>r</sup> John Glass at and before the Inclosing and delivery of the presents the receipt of which the S<sup>r</sup> John Covenhoven doth hereby acknowledge and therewith to be fully satisfied contented and paid hath granted bargain'd and sold and by these presents doth grant bargain and sell unto the S<sup>r</sup> John Glass and his heirs all that plantation of one hundred acres of land whereon the S<sup>r</sup> Glass now lives it being part of a tract of land Originally granted to Thomas Brounmit as will appear by a Grant bearing date the
