Know all men by these Presents that I Richard Hall of the State of South
Carolina and district of Greenville for and in consideration of the sum of
twenty two hundred and fifty dollars to me in hand paid by William Hall
of the State of Tennessee and County of Sumner, the Receipt whereof I the
said Richard Hall doth hereby acknowledge, and myself perfectly satisfied
therein, with contented and paid, hath bargained sold and delivered, and by
these presents doth bargain sell and deliver unto the said William Hall his
heirs and assigns forever the following negroes (to wit) one negro man named Harry
about twenty nine years of age, one negro man named Jesse about twenty or
twenty one years of age, one negro boy named George, about fourteen years
of age, one negro woman named Charlotte about twenty five years of age
one negro woman named Agnes about twenty two or three years of age, &
one negro girl child about eighteen months old (daughter to said woman
Agnes) named Isbell - All of said negroes with their increase I do hereby
warrant the right and property of unto the said William Hall his heirs & assigns
forever - from myself my heirs and from the lawful claim or demand of all & every
other person or persons whatsoever - In Witness whereof I have hereunto set
my hand and seal this 12th day of November 1814. Rich^d. Hall

N.B. It is mutually agreed to, and understood by the said Richard Hall and
William Hall, that the said William Hall is not to have possession of the
negro woman Charlotte and negro boy George named in the within
Bill of sale until the death of the said Richard Hall's wife Elizabeth
Hall, to whom said negroes are willed during her natural life, and
it is further understood that if either of said negroes Charlotte or George
should die before Elizabeth Hall, then and in that event the s^r. William
Hall is to have a Credit on a bond given to s^r. Rich^d. Hall by s^r. William
Hall on the 12th of November 1814 for nine hundred dollars, the
credit is to be four hundred and fifty dollars. Witness our hands
& seals this 12th of November 1814. - Rich^d. Hall
