sold and released and by these presents do grant bargain sell and release  
unto the said William Harrison a certain tract of land  
containing one hundred and fifty acres with a mill thereon  
situate in Greenville District and State aforesaid on the waters of Ray-  
Barns creek being part of a tract of Land granted to David Peden  
containing nine hundred and ten acres granted by his Excellency  
Charles Pinckney the 2nd day of March 1792 Beginning at a stone  
on the Widdow Peden's land running thence N. 60 E. 20 ch to a post  
Oak & thence N. 50 E. 48 ch to a white oak & thence N. 13 ch to a pine  
& thence E. 21 ch to a red oak & thence S. 65 W. 36 ch croping the creek  
the waterwood & thence S. 38 ch to the beginning together with all and  
singular the rights in embers hereditaments and appurtenances to the said  
premises belonging or in any wise incident or appertaining to have  
and to hold all and singular the premises before mentioned unto the  
said William Harrison his heirs and assigns for ever and we do hereby  
bind ourselves as Administrators of the Estate of David Peden deceased  
to warrant and forever defend all and singular the said premises unto  
the said William Harrison his heirs and assigns against ourselves and the heirs  
of David Peden deceased lawfully claiming or to claim the same or any
