

 ed, and by these presents, do grant, bargain, sell, and release, unto the said John
 E. Brown, all that tract or parcel of land situated, lying and being in the
 District and State aforesaid on the Waters of Clear Creek beginning on a stake
 on Sumiak Cleveland's line thence S. 73 E. 3. 50 to a white oak thence S. 75 E. 3. to
 post oak thence N. 20 E. 1. 50 to a chestnut thence N. 26 E. 2. 50 to a pine thence N. 63
 W. 6. 30 to a pine thence N. 66 W. 12. 50 to a black Gum thence N. 5 E. 2 to a post oak thence
 S. 37 1/2 E. 1. 50 to a red oak thence S. 60 E. 10 to a Black oak at the Creek thence N. 34 1/2
 W. 16. 40 to a chestnut thence S. 85. W. 1. 40 to a sweet Gum thence N. 25. W. 2 to a white
 oak thence N. 36 W. 12 to a stake on Browns line thence N. 87 E. 38. 50 to hickory thence
 S. 18 1/2 E. 38. 50 to the beginning containing one hundred and twelve acres as surveyed
