


by Samuel Tinsley and Martha Langford of the state and District aforesaid, have this day bargained and sold unto the said Tinsley and Martha Langford a certain tract or parcel of land lying in the state and District aforesaid, the north fork of Saluda waters of the Beavordam Creek beginning on a black oak, thence on Cobbs line to a Red oak bush thence on Waldripes line to a post oak thence on said line to a conditional corner on a spanish oak thence southwardly to a post oak thence eastwardly to pine corner thence on said condition line eastwardly to a stone corner Tinsley's corner thence on a conditional line to a maple thence on said condition line to the beginning corners to include one hundred acres more or less together with all and singular the rights members hereditaments and appurtenances thereunto belonging to have and to hold all and singular the premises above mentioned to the said Tinsley and Langford, their heirs and assigns forever And I do hereby bind myself, my heirs, executors and administrators to warrant and forever defend the same unto the said Tinsley and Langford their heirs and assigns against any person or persons lawfully claiming the same or any part thereof, as witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 6<sup>th</sup> of april, 1844, signed, sealed and delivered in the presence of us.
