The Hon. Secretary of State and the County Commissioners of Greenville and Spartanburg Counties

Having been appointed by the Supervisor of Greenville as a surveyor to locate the County Line between Greenville and Spartanburg Counties in connection with Mr George Gadschaw appointed by the Supervisor of Spartanburg County, we after consultation did agree upon the name W. J. Kirk of Abbeville Co. as the third Surveyor or referee.

We have entered upon the work and completed it in accordance with a joint Resolution of the Gen'l Assembly, approved Jan. 5<sup>th</sup>, 1895. Our instructions embodied in said Act required that the line should be run, "commencing at a stone on the No. Co. State Line just East of the Blackstock road and extending S 2 Degrees E - 22 miles and 64 chains or until it reached the Enoree River at Abners mill". It was agreed between Mr Gadschaw and myself when we met to commence this survey at the No. Co. State Line, that in order to facilitate the work we would use two Corps.

As an old and well established line always exists between the points named I deemed it expedient to retrace it, believing that this action would be in strict compliance with instructions laid down in the Joint Resolutions of the Legislature above mentioned. A careful and complete survey shows the following facts: namely: that this was the same line first established in 1767 and known as the "ancient Indian boundary line" to mark the
