Second: The name of the proposed Corporation to be that of Mutual Loan Fund of Greenville S.C.
 The principal place of business will be Greenville S.C.
 The general purpose of the Corporation and the nature of business it proposes to do, is to do that of making loans of money secured by mortgages of Real Estate by bonds or stocks or such security as may be deemed satisfactory by the Board of Directors; to build and rent houses; to buy and sell real estate, bonds, stocks, bonds and mortgages and other evidences of indebtedness, and in other methods to use and invest the funds of the Company by loaning the same at interest, or in such other way as may be deemed advisable.

Third: The amount of Capital Stock to be Fifty thousand Dollars, and the number of shares, into which the same is to be divided; to be Five Hundred of the par value One Hundred Dollars, each.
 And whereas, on the 2nd day of April 1894, the said above named petitioners were commissioned by me a Board of Corporators authorizing and empowering them to open books of subscription to the Capital Stock of said proposed Corporation giving not less than one day previous notice by advertisement in a newspaper published in the County of Greenville giving notice of the time and place where said books of subscription would be open.

And Whereas the said Board of Corporators on the 19th day of May did file with the Secretary of State their return in writing over their signatures certifying among other things that a majority of the Capital Stock has been subscribed and 50% of the first installment paid in, that the Company has been duly organized with the following:
