

Charter of Monaghan Mills:
The State of South Carolina.

Office of the Secretary of State,
When and where A. Smyth of Pickens Co., H. W. Parker
Greenville S.C., & J. G. Parker formerly of Philadelphia
Pa. but now of Greenville S.C. and W. J. Hayesworth
of Greenville S.C. be and they on the fourth day of January
1900, filed with the Secretary of State a written
Declaration signed by themselves setting
forth: - The names and residences of
the said petitioners to be as above given.

Second: The name of the proposed corporation
to be that of "Monaghan Mills."

The principal place of business of the corpora-
tion will be the city of Greenville South Carolina.

The general purpose of the Corporation, and
the nature of business it proposes to do, is
the manufacturing, spinning, weaving,
dyeing, printing, finishing and selling of
all goods of any kind, spun, woven, or made
of cotton or wool, or of such cotton wool, or
other fibrous articles, in any form, and
any other articles of any nature whatsoever
which they may from time to time desire
to manufacture, the buying of all articles
which may be used in said business, and
the buying and selling of merchandise
in connection with said Mill business
and the production, manufacturing and
repair of all machinery, tools, and imple-
ments necessary to be used for the said
manufacturing purposes, and the right to
develop, use, lease or buy power by steam
water, water, or other power, by any law
or laws, such agencies, or instruments
and to exercise all powers which may be
of any kind, and to use the said
corporation, and to buy, lease, or use
such Mill buildings, machinery, stock
building and other things which may be
required or which may be necessary
for the said business, and to do all acts
of any and all kind, not inconsistent with

Third: The amount of the capital stock to be Five
thousand Dollars, to be divided into five
thousand shares of the par value of one hundred
Dollars each.

And whereas, on the fourth day of January 1900,
the petitioners, the said petitioners, were commissioned
by the Secretary of State to call a meeting of the Board of Corporators, on
the 15th day of February 1900, did file with the
Secretary of State their return in writing over their
signature, certifying among other things, that
pursuant to the notice as required in
the Commission of the said Corporators, the
books of subscription to the capital stock of the
aforesaid company were duly opened and that
thereupon exceeding fifty per centum of the capital
stock was subscribed by bonafide stockholders
that thereupon a meeting of stockholders was
called and the aforesaid company duly organized
by the election of a Board of Directors, and other
necessary officers, that, furthermore, they have
complied with all the requirements of an act
of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina
entitled "An Act to Provide for the Incorporation
of Certain Corporations, and to Define the Powers
Thereof, approved the Ninth day of March A. D.
1896, and all acts amendatory thereto.

Now therefore, I, M. R. Cooper, Secretary of State,
by virtue of the authority in me vested by the
aforesaid Act, and Acts amendatory thereto, do
hereby certify that the said company has been fully
organized, according to the laws of South Carolina
under the name and for the purpose indicated
in their written declaration, and that they are
fully authorized to commence business under
their charter, and I do hereby direct that a copy of
this certificate be filed and recorded in the office
of the Register of Merce and Finance in each
county where such corporation shall have a
business office.
