

Recorder's office, Luzerne County, Pennsylvania in Vol. 1438, Page 709, described as follows: All that certain tract, piece or parcel of land situated, lying and being in Buck Township, Luzerne County, Pennsylvania, bounded and described as follows to wit: BEGINNING at a post in the north line of the Rensberger Survey 60 feet east of the tract corner; THENCE along the tract line 90.55 perches to a post; THENCE along land conveyed to Mrs. Anna Luton South 206.5 perches to a post; THENCE East 15.5 perches to a post; THENCE South 71.94 perches to the center of the old turnpike; THENCE along the said turnpike North $31\frac{1}{4}$ degrees West 16.2 perches North 27 degrees West 54.6 perches; North $22\frac{1}{4}$ degrees West 36.21 perches, North $53\frac{1}{4}$ degrees West 80 perches to a point in the said road 60 feet at right angles from the tract line; THENCE along a private road 60 feet wide, North 128.85 perches to the place of beginning. CONTAINING 100 acres of land, be the same more or less. BEING the same premises conveyed to Fred Goeringer, Jr., by Hugh R. Lewis, by Deed dated October 16, 1939, recorded in Luzerne County in Deed Book 786 at Page 538. Fred Goeringer, Jr., died intestate on June 9, 1944, his estate being filed in the office of the Register of Wills of Luzerne County to No. 698 of 1944, survived by his father, Fred Goeringer, Sr., and his mother, Catherine Goeringer, in whom title to the above described premises vested as Tenants by the Entireties under the Intestate Law of Pennsylvania, subject to the exceptions, reservations, conditions and restrictions contained therein.

Wharton Compressor Station Water Supply Site

That certain tract of land conveyed to the Company by deed from Elizabeth Glover Hetager dated February 25, 1965, recorded among the Deed Records of Potter County, Pennsylvania, in Deed Book 173, Page 112 and being more particularly described as follows: All that certain tract of land situated in Warrant Number 4922 in Wharton Township, Potter County, Pennsylvania, being more particularly described as follows: Beginning at a point in the south line of Warrant No. 4922 51 rods west of the southwest corner of the Copeland Lot, now owned by Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line Corporation; thence north 62 rods to a point; thence 60 rods west to a point; thence south 62 rods to a point on the Warrant line; thence east along the warrant line 60 rods to the place of beginning. Being lot known as the Bartron lot and
