

discharge of the debt hereby secured, or any portion thereof, and the proceeds of said sale should prove insufficient to satisfy the same with interest, taxes, fees, costs and charges, the amount remaining unpaid shall not be extinguished by the said mortgagee, his heirs or assigns becoming the purchaser of the premises.

Seventh; That if at any time any part of the debt hereby secured or interest thereon, or any of the sums authorized to be expended for improvements, taxes, liens, charges or insurance premiums be past due and unpaid the mortgagor does hereby assign the rents and profits of the above described premises to the mortgagee, and agree that any judge of the circuit Court of this State may in Chambers or otherwise, appoint a receiver, or receivers, with authority to take possession of said premises and collect and sell the said rents and profits, applying the net proceeds thereof, after paying costs of collection and sale, upon said debt, interest, or any sums expended for taxes, liens, charges or insurance premiums, or fees and expenses, without liability to account for anything more than the rents and profits actually collected.

Eighth; In the event of the passage, after the date of this mortgage, of any law of the State of South Carolina, deducting from the value of land for the purposes of taxation any lien thereon, or changing in any way the law for the taxation of mortgages or deeds of trust, or the debts secured by mortgage or deed of trust for State or local purposes, or the manner of the collection of any such taxes so as to affect this mortgage, the holder or holders of the said promissory notes which are hereby secured, shall have the right to give thirty days written notice to the owner of the premises hereinbefore described, requiring the payment of the debt or obligation hereby secured, if such notice be given, the said debt or obligation shall become due, payable and collectible at the expiration of said thirty days.

Ninth; That the mailing of a written notice or demand by depositing it in any post-office Station or letter box, enclosed in a post-paid envelope, addressed to the party of the first part and directed to such party

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
